Conversational strategies: Reframing the way we have creation care conversations.

- Theological Reframing
 - Call attention to ecological destruction through worship practices
 - Caring about the land has never been a competing cause with Christ
 - Recommended pastoral readings:
 - Recommended lay people readings:
- Social Reframing
 - Share personal stories people can connect with (MCC Global South Voices, community members...)
 - Listening to
 - Help someone find their own story
- Ecological Reframing
 - Understand your ecological region (your home). Find a local expert who your community respects and trusts. Take a tour.
 - Have a church service, Sunday school, activity outside
 - Read a book together. Book ideas: _____
- Political Reframing
 - De-politicize the conversation around climate change. Focusing on shared experiences, values.
 - Listen. Use neutral language (careful word use). Our allegiance is to the coming Kingdom, not this one.

Action Ideas

- Educate yourself and your community on the ecological realities in your community. How does the land/water/air/oppressed groups groan
 - Reach out to respected professionals within your communities to present to your congregation
 - Put on a movie night
- Brainstorm ways to share your under utilized resources (facilities, privilege...) how can we make space for the others that God loves? How can we be good defenders of all God's creation?
- Perform an energy audit (lots of free assessments for congregations)
- Commit to reading a book, focusing a bible study or Sunday school class on creation care
- Expand your vision of restoration/reconciliation. How your church's strengths/values work towards God's good future for all creation?

- Keep in mind/reflect upon your formative experiences: Earth was created as good, God so loved the world, shift around ecological understanding that started to see our interdependence with the rest of life (scientific perspective); being made in God's image as a good steward (how we are to relate with creation); respect for place (building understanding and relationship); relational language (interconnections between all beings); expanding definition of "caring for your neighbor"; creation as subject rather than an "it" - filled with life; we are part of creation
